New Long Distance Calling Options Prepare for Emergencies and Reduce Charges

Baptist's telecommunications department will soon be able to provide colleagues phone service through Baptist's data network, which will allow for local calls among all facilities, rather than long distance calls.

Because of the damage Hurricane Katrina caused and the resulting circuit problems and call volume, phone calls between Baptist's Mississippi hospitals were adversely affected. But telecom was able to provide some lines of communication through voice-over-internet protocol technology and by routing calls between the affected facilities and the Memphis phone switch, over the data network.

If a colleague wanted to reach Baptist Memorial Hospital-Golden Triangle, he or she would call using 9 and then enter his or her long distance code when prompted. Through enterprise dialing, colleagues simply dial 8 and then the number.

Enterprise dialing uses a similar technology but instead of special VOIP headsets, sites can use their current telephones. Telecom is connecting the phone switches at each Baptist facility. The primary benefit is to provide redundant calling in case of an emergency. Another benefit is a reduction in cost. For example, a call from Oxford to Memphis will start in Oxford, route to the Memphis phone switch through the data network, and then use the Memphis phone switch to call the number.

The project will be divided into three phases. Telecom has begun the first phase of the project, so it is now possible to call between BaptistCD facilities with no long distance charges.

Phase 1 will involve enabling calls between Baptist clinical documentation facilities; Phase 2 will involve

enabling dialing to local numbers serviced by BaptistCD hospitals; and Phase 3 will expand to other facilities as approved.

Locations for the first phase are Baptist's Corporate Building, Baptist DeSoto, Baptist Memphis, Baptist Women's Hospital, Baptist North Mississippi and Baptist Golden Triangle.

Here's how it works:

The call will go through the Memphis phone switch onto the data network and be routed to Columbus. At Columbus, it will route off the data network onto the Columbus phone switch and continue via the traditional lines to the end user desk phone.

The second phase will use the enterprise dialing network developed in Phase 1 to route calls between facilities and hand off the call to the local exchange, reducing long distance calls made to outside locations. For example, if a Memphis colleague phones a Columbus physician, she dials 9+1+662+245+9000. With enterprise dialing in Phase 2, this call is local to Columbus.

Monika Kolwaite, a physical therapist at **Baptist Rehabilitation-Germantown**, recently became a board-certified neurological specialist.

Board certification in a specialty area is the highest credential a therapist can receive. Fewer than 10 percent of American Physical Therapy Association members are certified specialists. According to the American Board of Physical Therapy Specialties, certification requires a minimum of 2,000 hours of clinical experience in the specialty area and successful completion of a written exam. Therapists must hold a current license, log a minimum number of patient care hours in their respective specialty and complete a competency assessment every 10 years to maintain their certification.

Two of the four practicing board-certified neurological specialists in the metro-Memphis area work in outpatient therapy at Baptist Rehab-Germantown.

CRASH Course is an intense health care career camp open to students who have completed their freshman, sophomore or junior year in high school and have an interest in a nursing career.

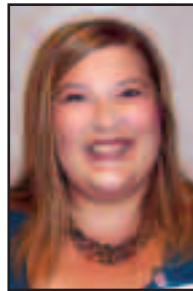

Service First Champion

Jennifer Borneman was named third quarter **Service First Champion for Baptist Memorial Hospital-Union City,**

selected from more than 400 colleagues. She is a secretary in outpatient rehabilitation and came to work for Baptist Union City in 2003. Here's an excerpt from her nomination...

"Recently we received a call from a case manager at Baptist Memphis referring a patient for outpatient wound care to be initiated upon the patient's discharge from the hospital. Jennifer handled the precertification and verification of benefits required prior to setting up an initial visit. She remained in contact with the case manager regarding the patient's planned discharge date. The patient, who lived in Troy, was diagnosed with extensive cancer and associated medical complications and received emergency care at Trenton before being transferred to Memphis. She had been hospitalized there since Feb. 22. The patient was discharged over a weekend and had an appointment for outpatient therapy on a Monday afternoon. By this time, Jennifer had begun communicating directly with the family. Upon calling the patient on Monday morning to confirm the therapy appointment, Jennifer learned that the patient was not residing with the mother in Trenton. The patient's mother asked Jennifer several questions regarding medications, follow-up appointments, and physician oversight. Jennifer realized in speaking

with the mother that the patient was on Coumadin, which required close monitoring, and none had been ordered at the hospital discharge. Jennifer contacted the case manager at Baptist Memphis, who said she was no longer involved since the patient had been discharged. So Jennifer then contacted the attending oncologist's office and spoke with staff, explaining the situation. Through this contact, follow-up labs were arranged and other needs addressed. Jennifer has maintained daily contact with this family, and this is just one example of her Service First attitude she exemplifies daily."

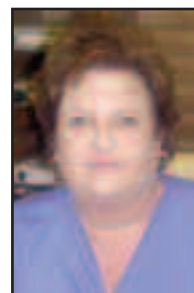
