

Behavioral health fills community need

Meeting the health care needs of the community means sometimes providing more than an emergency department and surgery suite. Two Baptist hospitals also have behavioral health centers to treat patients with psychological or chemical dependency issues.

Baptist Behavioral Health Care-Union City has 24 beds, and Baptist Behavioral Health Care-Willowbrook at Baptist Memorial Hospital-Golden Triangle operates 27 beds.

Baptist's behavioral health hospitals provide a necessary service for the Union City, Tenn., and Columbus, Miss., areas: inpatient services for patients 18 and older and outpatient services for children, adolescents and adults. Both have employee assistance services for area industries, and Willowbrook is contracted with some surrounding counties for civil commitments.

More importantly, both facilities have staff whose tenure is a testament to their willingness to serve and help others.

"Our staff is very passionate about this work," said David Johnson, director of Baptist Behavioral Health Care-Willowbrook. "We have a wonderful team here that has been here a long time — they care about our patients and our community."

beyond psychiatric and chemical dependency treatment. Grief groups and smoking cessation classes are offered by facility staff.

"We have also responded to workplace accidents and incidents to assist," said Linda Stoneburner, director of Baptist Behavioral Health-Union City. "We send appropriate staff to debrief and consult with employees."

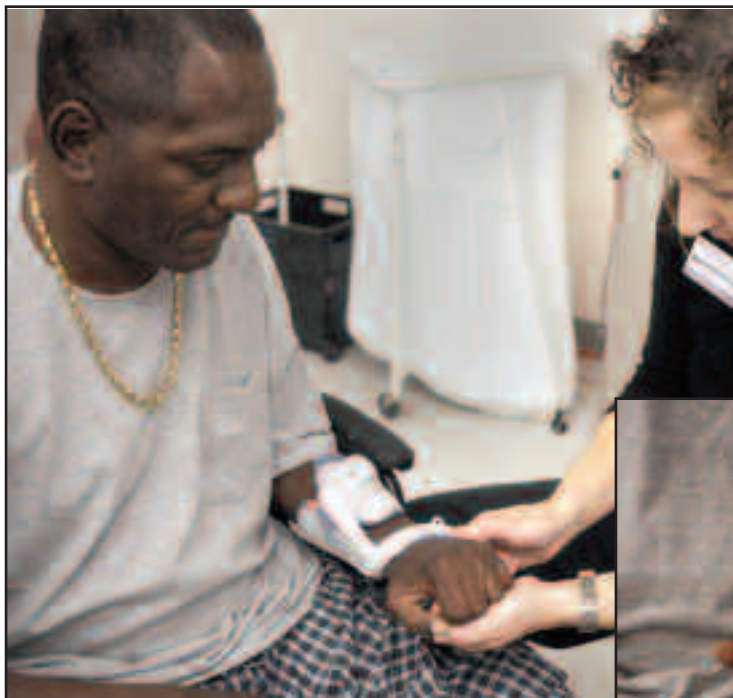
Baptist Behavioral Health-Union City offers day therapy, inpatient and outpatient admissions and treats psychiatric issues, chemical dependency problems and major depression. It has a staff psychiatrist who directs care and offers in-house consults for hospital patients if needed. It also works with local school systems, conducts free assessments and has free two-year aftercare for patients.

Baptist Behavioral Health Care-Willowbrook offers a continuum of services, including inpatient treatment, partial hospitalization, an intensive outpatient program for chemical dependency and outpatient services.

Both facilities serve as education centers for nursing students.

"This environment is one where patients require a lot of compassion and understanding," Stoneburner said. "We've answered a calling to help people, and it's very rewarding to see our patients make the inner changes to become healthier."

"From the top down, Baptist Memorial Hospital-Golden Triangle is an organization that really cares about its patients," Johnson said. "And offering comprehensive services is a commitment to the overall health care of the community."

FINANCIAL HEALTH MATTERS

What is your investor behavior?

Today the average life expectancy in the United States is 78 years. This average has increased about .67 percent per year since 1900.

This means that in 10 years, the average age at death will be 83, and by year 2027, it will be 88.

Today, a 65 year-old male is projected to live another 20 years, and females considerably longer than that. The fastest-growing segment of our population happens to be those 85 and older. In short, you are probably going to live a lot longer than your parents.

While life expectancy estimations have become a "science," market predictions tend to be counterintuitive. For example, I can tell you with great certainty what my 5-year-old daughter will do tomorrow, but I have no idea where she will be in 20 years. Conversely, I have no idea what the stock market will do tomorrow, but

I have a pretty good idea of where it will be in 20 years.

Markets become much more predictable as the time horizon extends. For those who believe investors act rationally, the knowledge of this should make investing for individual investors quite simple. As you may have experienced personally, this does not tend to be the case.

Dalbar, a Boston, Mass.-based financial services research firm, has made a science of analyzing individual investor behavior. During a study period from Jan. 1984 through Dec. 2002, stock fund investors trading for themselves returned 2.57 percent annually. This compares to a return of 12.22 percent annually for the S&P 500, one of the greatest market periods in history.

What went wrong?

Emotions can dominate decision-making, leading investors to make irrational buy and sell decisions. Here are a few things to keep in mind:

- Always focus on your objectives, not your emotions.
- Remember the goals you have established and the time frame that you have to invest.
- Stick with your investment plan and don't be concerned with the emotion that naturally exists in difficult market conditions.
- Avoid making impulsive decisions.
- Guard against making wholesale changes in your retirement account.
- Selling today cannot avoid yesterday's losses in a down market.
- In an up market, you cannot buy yesterday's performance by investing in the hottest fund.
- If you must make changes in your portfolio, do it in small increments.
- Maintain realistic expectations about market behavior.
- Financial markets move up

and down over time in response to social, political and economic events.

■ Equity (stock) investments are generally more volatile than other asset classes such as cash and bonds.

■ Talk periodically with someone about your account.

■ Only 20 percent of employers have an onsite representative for their retirement plan. Take advantage of this benefit provided to you.

■ Review your account every six-12 months. You make not make any changes, but it will be a good check-up.
