Hospital gowns go high-tech

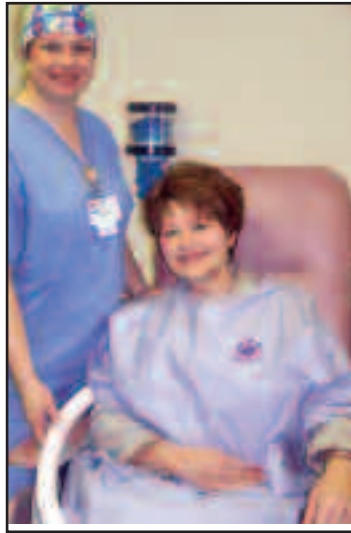
For more than 50 years, patient modesty has been a concern with traditional hospital gowns. For already anxious surgery patients, the traditional gowns did little to cover or provide warmth, leaving patients exposed and cold.

Now, a new high-tech hospital gown called Bair Paws is not only fully covering Baptist Memorial Hospital-Union City (BMH-UC) surgery patients, but actively warming them, too. "The Bair Paws gown is a simple yet effective product with comfort and clinical benefits," said Cheryl Mink,

director of surgery at Baptist Union City.

The single-use Bair Paws gown offers wrap-around coverage and soft, thick material and connects to the system's warming unit through a small hose. The warming unit blows warm air into the gown through specialized air channels with tiny perforations. Using a handheld controller, patients can adjust the temperature either warmer or cooler, depending on their personal preference.

The adjustable warmth the system provides not only provides comfort to patients, it offers clinical benefits as well—including the prevention of

Patient saved by quick-acting colleagues at Baptist Rehab-Germantown

If you don't believe in angels, Martha Massey wants to tell you a story.

The Germantown resident was walking as part of her therapy at Baptist Rehabilitation-Germantown one morning about a month ago.

She completed one lap just as Susan Stralka, CEO and administrator, was driving into the parking lot. The next thing Massey knew, she was a patient in the hospital.

"I was attending a seminar and left early to get to the hospital," Stralka said. "I remember being anxious because I had so much to do. I pulled into the parking lot and saw this lady go to the ground."

Stralka ran over and after checking for a pulse, began CPR.

"Our emergency response team responded quickly. It appeared she suffered sudden cardiac arrest," Stralka said. "Anyone CPR-trained would have done the same thing; I just happened to be there. The team really did an outstanding job caring for her."

Massey is thankful people were there to help.

"Mere words of thanks aren't enough," she said. "Everyone knew what to do and was there to help."

Massey, who has lived in Germantown for more than 30 years, is eager to begin exercising again.

"My life was saved," Massey said. "That day, I had angels looking out for me."

Baptist comes clean

Baptist is participating in a citywide hand hygiene initiative to enhance hand hygiene practices.

Baptist's metro-Memphis hospitals, along with other area hospitals, as part of the Memphis Quality Initiative, are participating in "Come Clean," which will monitor hand hygiene practices of physicians and clinical staff, train health care colleagues on proper hand hygiene and improve compliance through feedback intervention.

According to the initiative, 43 percent of physicians don't practice proper hand hygiene in the ICU. Many other hospitals have shown significantly enhanced outcomes following hand hygiene compliance.

Jason Little, administrator and CEO, Baptist Memorial Hospital-Memphis; Lisa Moore, director of risk management and infection control at Baptist Memphis; Cindy York, RN, infection control, Baptist Memphis; and Michael Threlkeld, MD, chairman of the infection control committee at Baptist Memphis, are part of the hand hygiene committee.

The initial phase will focus on the intensive care unit and also on physicians.

Memphis Quality Initiative is a collaboration of Memphis-area hospitals that implements citywide, noncompetitive quality improvement programs.
